
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Current Issue: Decreasing Birth Rates In Singapore

This is not the first time we are hearing that our population is aging. However, the awakening is that as we stride into 2019, it will mark an important cross-road for Singapore's stakeholders. 2018 was the first time in modern Singapore history that the number of below 15 year olds will equal that of above 65 year olds. We are officially at a demographic crossroad.

To make matters worse, the gap will only widen as we move into the next decade and beyond. By 2030, we estimate the percentage of below 15 year olds to fall to only 11%, while that of the above 65 year olds will reach 27% of the resident population. That will put us in the similar situation as Japan today. And it is only a short 12 years away
